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Brentwood Park Master Plan Public Meeting #2 Meeting Summary and Survey Results Brentwood Park Neighborhood Center, 6 pm August 9, 2017

On July 13, 2017, the second public meeting was held at the Brentwood Park Neighborhood Center. Community participants were given an opportunity to voice their opinions and provide comments on two concepts. There was an average of 70 participants present for the meeting. A PowerPoint presentation highlighting the results of the public input gathered at the first public meeting as well as two conceptual master plans for Brentwood Park entitled "Concept A: Play Zones" and "Concept B: Interactive" were presented.

General Discussion:

- Several participants mentioned that they envision Brentwood Park as a neighborhood rather than a destination park.
- Safety and security real vs. perceived
- Renovate and staff the building, demolish or relocate?
- Phasing and expected costs, determining priorities as we move forward to Phase 1.
- What is the timetable for the project need time for design, permitting and construction
- Connectivity to the neighborhood and the broader greenway network is important

Survey Results:

Approximately 37 respondents provided written comments to our survey, though not all respondents answered each question. Below is a summary of our findings. The actual tallied results can be found at the conclusion of this document, beginning on page 4.

Question 1 (5 parts)

Question 1A: Participants were asked if they would prefer the Neighborhood Center be renovated only or renovated and expanded.

- Renovation only: 16
- Renovation & expansion: 12

Analysis: Based upon the results and some of the comments received, it seems as though more engagement around the community center would be useful. There appears to be a lot of hope for what it could provide, but a lot of concerns about the cost, availability of staff, and possibly its current location.

Question 1B: Participants were asked if they would prefer more or less parking than shown

- More parking: 7
- Less parking: 16

Analysis: Participants indicated they would prefer less parking.

Question 1C: Participants were asked if they would prefer a large playground or a small playground

- Large playground: 25
- Small playground: 5

Analysis: A clear preference for a large playground was demonstrated. Additional engagement around the types of playground amenities and the look and feel of those amenities would be beneficial.

Question 1D: Participants were asked if they would prefer more open play areas or less open play areas

- More open play areas: 25
- Less open play areas: 6

Analysis: A clear preference for more open play areas was demonstrated. Written comments expressed interest in soccer.

Question 1E: Participants were asked if they would prefer the greenway be placed along Marsh Creek or through the park

- Greenway along Marsh Creek: 12
- Greenway through the park: 17

Analysis: Though a clear preference was not demonstrated, a greenway through the park is in keeping with many of the comments voiced in preference of a larger vegetated stream buffer and engaging more activity inside the park.

Question 2 (2 parts)

Question 2A: Participants were asked which concept they prefer, Concept A, Concept B, or a Combination of both

- Concept A (Play Zones): 4Concept B (Interactive): 15
- Combination of A & B: 18

Question 2B: Participants were asked why they selected what they did. Please see the tallied results for respondents' answers.

Analysis: There was a general preference for a combination of Concept A and B, though most preferred the elements found in B, particularly the Challenge Course and the Open Play Areas, there were some preferences indicated for the gym in Concept A.

Question 3 (2 parts)

Question 3A: Participants were asked if you chose Combination A & B, which elements you would keep from Concept A. Please see the tallied actual results. The top selections were:

- Spray plaza: 5
- Open play areas: 4Basketball: 3Pickleball: 3
- Outdoor gym: 3
- Parking lot configuration: 3

Question 3B: Participants were asked if you chose Combination A & B, which elements you would keep from Concept B. Please see the tallied actual results. The top selections were:

- Challenge course: 8
- Large playground: 3Outdoor gym: 3
- Mist sculpture: 3
- Bigger forested stream buffer: 3
- Combined restroom and playground: 4
- Internal Greenway alignment: 3

Analysis: These questions were open ended, so the results varied more than if the answers were preprogrammed. Within that context, however, there was a strong preference for the spray plaza, the challenge course, an outdoor gym, and the larger playground with shelter and restroom complex.

Question 4

Participants were asked what kind of interior spaces they would want to see in the Neighborhood Center and what kinds of classes and programs they would be interested in participating in as well as the best uses for the Center. Please see the tallied actual results. The top selections were:

- Community events and neighborhood meetings: 7
- Updated kitchen facilities: 6
- After school programs: 5
- Gym/weight room: 5
- Upgraded bathrooms: 4
- Art (including pottery, painting): 4
- Nature classes for kids: 4
- Upgraded seating areas (carpeted floors, bean bags, small tables, sofas, reading areas): 4
- Yoga: 3Sports: 3
- Board game areas/game nights: 4
- Free public Wi-Fi: 3Sustainable features: 3Ping pong/foosball: 3

Analysis: These questions were open ended, so the results varied more than if the answers were preprogrammed. Overall, there seemed to be a preference for a space for community meetings, updated and upgraded kitchen and bathroom facilities, activities for kids after school, exercise opportunities, preferences for computers and Wi-Fi capabilities, and for sustainable features like solar panels.

Question 5

Participants were asked if they had other comments to share. Top responses included:

- Skateboard friendly areas (half pipe, ramps): 7
- Preference for soccer field (maintain current size, add goals, etc.): 6
- Remove pickleball or question its use: 5
- Gender neutral restroom with male and female, too: 3
- Basketball is played every day (frequent use)- keep double court, should not be smaller: 3
- Connectivity to other streets, especially Glenridge, neighborhood and greenways: 3

Analysis: The demographic at this meeting indicated a preference for items not previously identified as a strong preference including skateboard friendly items.
