



Your Consensus Choices:

- 1. Endorsement (Member fully supports it)

- 4. Stand aside with major reservations (Formal disagreement, but will not block or hold up the proposal/provision)
- 5. Block (Member will not support the proposed plan)

Measuring Consensus:

- Consensus = All committee members present rate the proposal as a 1,2, or 3
- Consensus with Major Reservations = All committee
 members present rate the proposal as a 1,2, or 3, expect at
 least one Committee member rates it as a 4
- No Consensus = Any committee member rates the proposal as a 5


OBJECTIVES:


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Our Past: History of PEJ + Previous Plan Highlights



Origins of PEJ

- Formed in 1996 as Episcopalians for Environmental Justice (EE) Committee
- Committee established "Walnut Creek 2000" project
- Effort grew, became Partners for Environmental Justice (PEJ) as additional members joined




PEJ Vision and Focus

- Restore wetland to its former natural state prior to damage and neglect
- Establish wetland park
- Incorporate the wetland into the city's greenway system
- Improve the quality of surrounding neighborhoods -- address issues of flooding and trash dumping



Vision: Walnut Creek Wetland Park...a "Destination Park"



Markers of Progress:

- 39 Big Sweep wetland cleanups organized over 19 years
- 105,000 pounds of trash removed since 2006



Markers of Progress:

- Bond referendums
 - 2003 -- \$2,060,000 for WCWC
 - 2014 -- \$1,000,000 for WCWP
- Wetland Center opened in 2009
- Center's programming continues to grow
- WCWP planning process



Continuing Concerns:

- Trash dumping and runoff from downtown Raleigh and Cary watersheds
- Invasive species
- Vision for local economic growth slow to progress



Missed Opportunity

- In 2005, the City of Raleigh declined to partner with National Audubon on the Walnut Creek Wetland Center project
- Planning the WCWP with strong vision and commitment important

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

 - Lacked Voice at City Council





Goals

Location





Wetland Education Park

- 1998: PEJ Commissioned Dr. Robin Moore (NCSU NLI) & Four Grad Students To Develop Conceptual Park Plan
- Wetland Educational Park located along natural area between Garner Road and State Street north of Walnut Creek
- NLI: "Carefully design natural environments to maintain balance necessary for well being & healthy development of children."



Schematic Master Plan

- 30 Page comprehensive document laying out PEJ/Community's Vision for Park Property (December 2002)
- Schematic Plan Map focal point of Plan.
- General Elements: Center Building, Access Points, Outdoor Learning Centers, Trails
- Specific Elements: Amphitheatre, Areas (Nature Crafts, Daycamp, Native American Activity, Wetland Study Station)



Current PEJ Vision

- Unique Destination Park: focused on how wetlands work, Walnut Creek's natural and cultural history, conservation & protection
- Educational Programming For All Ages (0-100+): natural materials, 'loose play' areas, NO active recreation (ballfields, ATV's etc.)
- Multiple Access Points to the Creek & wetlands: Ross Andrews Trail, boardwalk & bridges, tree canopy observation platforms. Connect neighborhoods on both sides of Creek.



Current PEJ Vision (cont)

- Serve surrounding neighborhoods with expanded community gardens, cultural, activities, and be a community gathering place
- Incorporate arts, education, and economic development in plans and programs.
 Example: use Park to train & employ developmentally-disabled adults in supportive work
- Lack of consensus on reach, breadth & audience of Park (local to worldwide?)

- Provides access from Park's Visitor Center to swamp forest wetland
- Boardwalk designed & constructed by Park staff




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
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Outdoor Recreation Possibilities: Cashie River Treehouse Village

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
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Outdoor Recreation Possibilities: Outdoor Classroom






Flora and Fauna

Refuge in an urbanized area for:

- Bottomland Hardwood Forest-green ash, red maple dominated
- Emergent Shrub/Scrub Community- Willow, herbaceous emergent wetland plants
- Wildlife-geese, ducks, hawks, migratory songbirds, red-winged blackbirds
- Deer, raccoons, opossums, squirrels, rabbits, coyotes
- Amphibians and reptiles-turtles, frogs, snakes




